## Special Education Awareness

Tri-City Seventh-day Adventist School has limited Special Education resources. Teachers implement accommodations and modifications for students within the school's ability to provide. Students applying for admission to Tri-City Seventh-day Adventist School from other schools, homeschool, or who are beginning their academic journey, who have an established IEP, 504, or are suspected of having needs (physical, mental, emotional, and behavioral) that impact their academic experience are required to provide copies of such documents during the enrollment application process.
